Sahiyo formed in 2015 as an advocacy collective of South Asian and other survivors of female genital cutting (FGC), also known as female genital mutilation, to address the lack of acknowledgment around FGC as a global form of gender-based violence and child abuse. We empower communities left out of the discourse on FGC to create systemic change and abandon this centuries-long practice. We utilize collaborative grassroots campaigns and storytelling techniques to train members of FGC practicing communities to lead in demanding widespread abandonment, work with frontline professionals (i.e. healthcare providers) to create culturally sensitive systems of care for survivors, and partner with government officials to address policy-level change.

Those unaddressed violence strongly shaped and correlated to their concepts and ideas of manhood and masculinity. We realized that education and awareness about sexism, homophobia, transphobia, etc. was not enough to address the gaps and nuances of these issues. This led us to intentionally design spaces and relationships where male folks could get support safely; open up vulnerably; seek advice from other men; learn healing practices; be in restorative circle processes.

Those numbers continue to increase as our capacity expands. With this reality in mind, AADA is seeking to use the funding from this grant to reach at least 350 clients over the next year.

This perspective is reflected in our broad strategy that integrates culturally grounded and language-accessible shelter and transitional housing services, culturally specific violence intervention and prevention programs, economic empowerment and entrepreneurship projects, systems and public policy advocacy, community mobilization and cultural change initiatives, and community-based participatory evaluation and research.
